
To him, an individual's potential is limited only by desire. His support in assisting his students to realize their hopes with their abilities is unflagging.







To prepare its students for vocations in the business world is the objective of the commercial department. Those who decide not to go to college are ready, upon graduation, for various types of skilled employment.





LANGUAGES




Even though the Warriors were often outscored, the team this year was noted for its enthusiasm and hard hitting, which should carry over to next year.






The junior high team began the season slowly, but completed with a five game winning streak and a record of five wins and three losses.



Nevertheless, the abilities of the underclassmen will be better developed and the experience gained will be a definite asset to the team.









